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Do you find that you need to create small reminders in your life so that you don't forget things? Post-it notes stuck around your desk. Notifications on your phone. A note card taped to your mirror. We're all guilty of forgetting things and sometimes need gentle reminders. The same is true in our life as disciples. Author C.S. Lewis once noted that as Christians, we need reminding more than we need instruction. How true is that?!

In the first century, the church at Colossae was under attack from false teachers seeking to persuade them that the person and work of Jesus Christ was neither supreme nor sufficient for not only salvation but their lives. They began to share a gospel of Jesus, plus. Jesus, plus knowledge. Jesus, plus rituals. Being concerned for a flock he had never visited, the Apostle Paul writes a letter to remind the church about who Jesus Christ is and to stand in the truth and power of the gospel that has saved them. Our King and His Kingdom are here. Embrace it and live in it with confidence. Jesus is greater than.

As we navigate our modern times, we face a similar dilemma...is Jesus enough? Or do we need Jesus, plus something else to ensure not only our salvation but the life we want to live. There are so many philosophies and choices in our busy information heavy culture to order our lives around. We may need a simple reminder that Jesus is still and will always be greater than.

The letter of Colossians is the reminder we need that Jesus is our all in all and nothing should be greater than Him. He is the deep desire of our soul and longing of our heart. Our lives are transformed, and we transform those around us when He is greater than everything else in our life. Nothing compares to Jesus.

HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

The workbook may be used during weekly teaching lessons, personal study time and group discussion.

3-THIRDS STUDY METHOD

Scripture is the expert. The Holy Spirit is the ultimate teacher (John 14:26). Our goal is to encourage our church to read the Bible and discover what God has to say to them. God's Word is full of revelations just waiting to be discovered. Simple, memorable questions allow a disciple to: 1) discover and understand the character of God, 2) encourage them to obediently apply Scripture to their life and 3) share it with others.

This Bible study method promotes the authority of God's Holy Word, practical daily discipleship and evangelism. It removes the need for an "expert" to lead them and trusts the Holy Spirit to reveal truth to each group member. This method of looking at Scripture gives each person a simple, memorable way to daily dig into God's Word on their own and learn from the Holy Spirit.

Bottom line: Our mission is to make disciples, who make disciples, who make disciples and thus to see God raise up a DISCIPLE MAKING MOVEMENT that will bless the people of this city, this state, this nation and the ends of the earth (Matthew 28:18-20).

You will see a similar structure each week that divides your Bible study into 3-Thirds: **Look Back, Look Up and Look Forward.** Each section explores how God's Word is transforming our lives as we live it out in our daily routines. Prayer is necessary for this type of Bible study because we need the Holy Spirit to guide us into all truth and reveal to us the thoughts of God (John 16:13-15; 1 Cor. 2:10-16). We must invite the Holy Spirit into our study as we seek to discover truths about God and His Gospel. Commit to obey, not just hearers of His Word but doers of His Word, and pledge to share what we know with others.

HOW TO P.R.A.Y

There is no special formula for prayer. There are no "buzz words" or phrases that capture God's attention more than any other. Prayer is pouring your honest, surrendered heart out to God and seeking His answers to your struggles. When asked by His disciples about prayer, Jesus responded with the Lord's Prayer.

"This, then, is how you should pray: 'Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one." Matthew 6:9-13 (NIV)

Jesus' response points out four key attributes of prayer. We've made an acrostic to make it easy to remember every time you pray. This isn't a formula, but if you need a little direction in your prayers, this serves as a great guide.

PRAISE: Praise God for who He is and His attributes. Begin by giving Him your worship and adoration.

REPENT: Confess to God the things you have done in word, thought or deed which led you into sin. Confess and repent.

ASK: After you have spent time in praise and repentance, make your requests known to God by asking Him to provide your needs.

YIELD: God is always at work around you. Take time to notice when He invites you to join Him to become part of His mission.



HOW TO USE S.O.A.P.S.

Open your Bible and ask God to illuminate what He wants you to learn and apply today. God's Word says that the Holy Spirit "will guide you into all truth" (John 16:13) and will help you understand what you read from the scriptures. Read the passage slowly and look for that specific "gem" of truth that jumps off the page and grabs your attention.

SCRIPTURE Choose one Bible verse that stands out to me and copy it word for word.

OBSERVATION What does this verse teach me about my relationship with God?

APPLICATION How will I be different because of what I've read today?

PRAYER Write out a prayer asking God to help me live out what I've just learned.

SHARE Share what you learned with one person.



AN INTRODUCTION TO FIRST CENTURY COLOSSAE

Colossae was in the region of Phrygia, in the Lycus River valley of westcentral Asia Minor. Due to its location, it was at one time known for being the center of a thriving textile industry. However, because of a change in the roadway system, it began to decline as trade shifted toward Laodicea. In the time the Apostle Paul wrote this letter (Colossians 4:18), Colossae was no longer considered large or important. But because of the growing Christian community there, we are still talking about Colossae today.

As far as we know, the Apostle Paul had never visited Colossae (Colossians 2:1), therefore, he was not the founder of the church there. So, who was the founder? As we study this letter, we will see that it was the faithful Epaphras who initially brought the message of salvation, the gospel, to the people of this city (Colossians 1:7-8). We also observe that this Christian community was predominantly, though not exclusively, made of Gentile believers. It seems that, while he was in prison (Colossians 4:3, 18), the Apostle Paul wanted nothing more than to encourage his brothers and sisters in Christ (Colossians 1:3-6), call them to continue to turn from the sins of their culture (Colossians 1:9-12) and reject false spiritual teachings (Colossians 2:4-8), holding fast to Jesus Christ, in whom the fullness of deity dwells in bodily form (Colossians 2:9).

1 This letter is from Paul, chosen by the will of God to be an apostle of Christ Jesus, and from our brother Timothy.

2 We are writing to God's holy people in the city of Colosse, who are faithful brothers and sisters in Christ. May God our Father give you grace and peace.

3 We always pray for you, and we give thanks to God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. 4 For we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and your love for all of God's people, 5 which come from your confident hope of what God has reserved for you in heaven. NOTES

16 So don't let anyone condemn you for what you eat or drink, or for not celebrating certain holy days or new moon ceremonies or Sabbaths. 17 For these rules are only shadows of the reality yet to come. And Christ himself is that reality. 18 Don't let anyone condemn you by insisting on pious self-denial or the worship of angels, saying they have had visions about these things. Their sinful minds have made them proud, 19 and they are not connected to Christ, the head of the body. 

2 Devote yourselves to prayer with an alert mind and a thankful heart. 3 Pray for us, too, that God will give us many opportunities to speak about his mysterious plan concerning Christ. That is why I am here in chains. 4 Pray that I will proclaim this message as clearly as I should.

5 Live wisely among those who are not believers, and make the most of every opportunity. 6 Let your conversation be gracious and attractive so that you will have the right response for everyone.

7 Tychicus will give you a full report about how I am getting along. He is a beloved brother and faithful helper who serves with me in the Lord's work. 8 I have sent him to you for this very purpose—to let you know how we are doing and to encourage you. 9 I am also sending Onesimus, a faithful and beloved brother, one of your own people. He and Tychicus will tell you everything that's happening here.

10 Aristarchus, who is in prison with me, sends you his greetings, and so does Mark, Barnabas's cousin. As you were instructed before, make Mark welcome if he comes your way. 11 Jesus (the one we call Justus) also sends his greetings. These are the only Jewish believers among my co-workers; they are working with me here for the Kingdom of God. And what a comfort they have been!

12 Epaphras, a member of your own fellowship and a servant of Christ Jesus, sends you his greetings. He

always prays earnestly for you, asking God to make you strong and perfect, fully confident that you are following the whole will of God. 13 I can assure you that he prays hard for you and also for the believers in Laodicea and Hierapolis.

14 Luke, the beloved doctor, sends his greetings, and so does Demas. 15 Please give my greetings to our brothers and sisters at Laodicea, and to Nympha and the church that meets in her house.

16 After you have read this letter, pass it on to the church at Laodicea so they can read it, too. And you should read the letter I wrote to them.

17 And say to Archippus, "Be sure to carry out the ministry the Lord gave you."

18 HERE IS MY GREETING IN MY OWN HANDWRITING—PAUL.

Remember my chains.

May God's grace be with you.
